SOCIAL CARE

NVQ LEVEL 4

Course Synopsis

This course is designed to introduce students to careers in the field of Social Care for vulnerable individuals and groups of all ages who experience marginalization, disadvantage or special needs. As well as protecting, and advocating for, such individuals and groups, Social Care Workers professionally guide, challenge and support those entrusted to their care towards achieving their fullest potential. Client groups are varied and include children and adolescents in residential care; young people in detention schools; people with intellectual or physical disabilities; people who are homeless; people with alcohol/drug dependency; families in the community; or older people. Social Care work is based on interpersonal relationships which require empathy, strong communication skills, self-awareness and an ability to use critical reflection. Teamwork and interdisciplinary work are also important in social care practice.

The center training will be followed by at least 3 months On the Job Training, in the course of which trainees should keep diaries and reflect on their experiences, and prepare reports about their interventions.

Job Outlook and Objectives

Sri Lanka has a long history of social interventions, but unlike services in education and health, the basis of social care seems to have been the old British system whereby recipients were seen as objects of charity rather than individuals who needed support to fulfill their full potential. As a result, care workers have generally not been adequately trained. Where training does occur, it is often theoretical, without development of the empathy and interaction skills that are vital for the nurture that recipients of care need.

As the country registers the need for better child care, and care for persons with disabilities in accordance with international standards, we are also facing increasing need for elder care as social structures change and family support systems weaken.

This course is designed to develop professional sympathetic carers who understand the need to both look after their clients and ensure social interactions and emotional well being. At the same time, while the country needs such carers, the world too requires better services in this field so trained carers will also have access to lucrative employment in other countries.

Career paths available following completion of the course

- Care services for individuals in need, both in Sri Lanka and abroad
- Employment in Care Centers
- Volunteers with organizations which carry out care projects
- Community based care
- Community based workers
- Foster parenting

Underpinning knowledge

Students are required to have a basic understanding of the psychology of a person and of the stages of human development. They must evince positive attitudes and a commitment to the full wellbeing of clients.

Modules to be covered

1. Introduction to Social Care

This course module is designed to introduce basic professional social care to students who will enter the social care profession. It will provide basic social care knowledge, skills, attitudes and mind sets for a beginner in the social care profession to work with institutionalized children, elders; disabled persons with medical illnesses and mental illnesses and families, families with poverty etc.

2. Introduction to Social Work Profession

This course module is designed to introduce students to the basic concepts of social work. It provides the knowledge required to understand different problem solving approaches in the contemporary scenario such as social work, social services, social welfare and social development. It also discusses the uses of basic methods and techniques in social work practices when working with a variety of human systems and their impact on the day to day life of the service user. It also introduces the role of the social worker in promoting the right of service users to develop their fullest potential.

3. Health and Social Care

This module provides the knowledge required to ensure health through social care and will give students further insights to enhance skills, attitudes and a form of mind set to work in the field of health and social care. As a social care worker, the student need to understand the basics of caring for another person, in terms of managing illness or injury and promoting health and well-being at family, institution and community level. While caring for the patient/ social care needy, the care worker is placed in a vulnerable position with regards his or her own health and well-being as well. Therefore, the caring cycle will only be completed when they learn how to take care of themselves, in terms of managing health and safety hazards and promoting their own health and well-being.

4. Human Growth and Development

This module provides knowledge on the basic concepts of human growth & development. It focuses on the knowledge required as to the stages of growth of persons at different periods of the life span & the knowledge required to understand the relationship between human behavior & the social environment, with a view to ensuring the building of human relationships. This course is also expected to enable the participants to apply knowledge on human growth and development to social care practice.

5. Social Skills

This module provides the social skills required for professional social care workers to build the relationship with the clients/ service users. This will practically improve the student's professional relationships and develop social skills to make maximum use of their knowledge.

6. Mental Health for Promoting Social Care

This module is designed to introduce students to learn the basic concepts and theoretical & practical knowledge related to mental health social care practices and basic counseling. This will introduce students to skills and techniques required for basic counseling and explain the

basics on service user assessment, risk identification, safety planning and formulation of intervention strategies in mental health intervention and counseling. The participants are also introduced to the code of ethics that needs to be adhered to in counseling.

7. Social Care in a multi-cultural society

This module is designed to make students aware of how best to work in a multicultural society. It provides students with knowledge required to understand the multi-cultural dimensions of Sri Lankan society. It promotes ethnic harmony among communities, through the work of social care workers. It further introduces the concept of multiculturalism & the history of ethnic & cultural relationships in Sri Lanka, and the need for promoting a caring society.

8. Social Care for Different Groups

This module provides the knowledge and skills needed in different settings (namely at schools, displacement, disability, elderly and industrial settings). Social care workers should possess specific skills to work with individuals, family, groups and communities. Rights based practices & service delivery will be used in order to identify social care needs of different groups as to avoid vulnerability. The module would endeavor to instill the relevant values and ethics in working with different groups in practice.

9. Social Care with Elderly

This module introduces students to the significance of the human ageing process, and the role of social care for promoting senior citizen's rights. It provides knowledge of social aspects of ageing & social care, discussing the role and responsibilities of social care workers for promoting rights of older persons. The module would endeavor to inculcate in students the relevant values & ethics in working with elderly to promote healthy independent living among senior citizens.

10. Social Care with Disability

This module introduces students to basic concepts related to persons with disability. It provides knowledge related to disability, focusing on reality and the propensity for victimization and/or exclusion, which must be addressed proactively. It provides skills for social care practices for persons with disability, at the intervention level for individuals, groups, families & communities.

11. Career Skills 2

This module is compulsory in all NVQ Level 4 courses. It builds on the soft skills developed on NVQ Level 3 courses. This will enable students to enjoy productive employment that requires fulfilling responsibilities. This course develops communicative skills in English and the ability to read and write constructively, and a command of grammar to facilitate this. It also develops cognitive skills with regard to effective work and the ability to work efficiently alone and in a team.

12. Field Practice (On-the-Job Training)

This module provides the required opportunities for students to gain vital "hands-on" experience to deal with problems identified. This placement is scheduled as 'on the job training' sessions for a period of 6 months. The practicum will involve working with individuals, families, groups and communities. This unit would also familiarise the participants with the workings of the service delivery system. The participants can select locations in the relevant Divisional Secretariat (DS) divisions or social welfare organisations

to accommodate the practical proposition of allowing the participants to attend their 'on the job' tasks required to prepare them for social care. This is a supervised placement for them to learn while working.

Students will be required to maintain diaries during this period and reflect together with peers on work they have done and discuss possible interventions and work towards understanding best practice. They will need to prepare monthly reports and discuss these with supervisors. They will be expected to develop:

- a. Ability to test the knowledge gained and apply the skills required for a social worker
- b. Ability to apply values, principles, techniques and intervention strategies on the basis of best ethical practices in social care
- c. Maintain records for their own social care work and ensure information is systematically preserved as needed on a confidential basis

3. Health and Social Care	50 hours

This course is also expected to enable the participants to apply knowledge on human growth and development to social care practice.</p>

<p>Competencies (these follow on competencies prescribed for Career Skills 1, which should be introduced / revised before moving on)</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Understand and use simple expressions to communicate This subject provides the necessary communication skills so that students can express individual ideas, emotions, preferences, frame and answer questions with regard to reasons and methods, explain simple procedures, understand and respond to complex instructions, describe daily routines, conduct and respond to interviews, express ability and inability and describe a process sequentially b. Read and write effectively This subject provides students with the necessary skills to write about how they feel, connect sentences meaningfully, read and carry out instructions, understand/produce arguments, read/write longer texts and summarize them, prepare reports and charts, write Personal and Official Letters and apply for jobs c. Use English correctly This subject is not taught separately but is included in the development of the productive and receptive skills above, since awareness of the structure of the language is necessary for these The development of appropriate vocabulary is also targeted to deploy the above skills d. Develop the capacity to think and plan productively This subject develops cognitive abilities and skills with regard to effective work, with strengthening of the ability to organize information and assess information to solve problems systematically, understand chronological order, develop the concepts of mind and task mapping and apply them, understand governmental structures and coordination mechanisms, collect information and prepare development plans and make chronological charts. e. Develop effective working capacity This subject develops the capacity to work effectively individually and in collaboration with others through presenting themselves positively, understanding the advantages of working together, understanding the characteristics of different people and the impact these have, speaking persuasively and understanding and working with maps f. Develop effective working capacity Students will be able to work with computers so as to enter information swiftly and store it systematically, retrieve it easily, communicate on email, and use social media with due attention to ethics g. Students will plan and implement two group projects, one with regard to environmental protection, the other a social service project in response to identified community needs. Students should plan the project systematically, target specific outcomes, report on progress, and evaluate the project on completion.
