CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

- 01. Informal Advertisements: Advertisements published in the classified columns of the newspapers
- 02. Formal Advertisements: Advertisements published by enterprises with their own titles in the newspaper.

Following concepts and definitions used in the Quarterly Labour Force Survey, conducted by the Department of Census & Statistics, have been used in this publication.

- **03.** Labour Force: The labour force is composed of the economically active population of 15 years of age and over.
- **04.** The Economically Active population: Is defined as those persons who are/ were employed or unemployed during the reference period of the survey.
- **05. Not in labour force (not economically active) :** Persons who were neither working nor available/looking for work are classified as "not in the labour force". Persons are not in the labour force for such reasons as: full time care of the household, full-time students, retired or old age, infirmed or disabled, or are not interested in working for one reason or another.
- **06. Employed**: Persons, who worked as paid employees, employers own account workers (self employed), or unpaid family workers during the reference period are said to be employed. This includes persons with a job but not at work during the reference period.
- **07. Unemployed**: Persons available and/or looking for work, and who did not work and tried to find a job during the reference period.
- **08.** Employee: The person, who works for payment.
- 09. Employer: The person, who employs at least one paid employee under him
- 10. Own account worker: The person, who works for own or only with contributory family workers.
- 11. Unpaid family worker: The person who works on his own family enterprise without any payment.
- **12. Unemployment rate**: Represent the number of unemployed persons as a percentage of the economically active labour force.
- **13. Reference Period :** In this survey there are two (2) reference periods, "current" reference period is the week preceding the week of the survey, i.e., last week. The "usual" reference period preceding 12 months, i.e., the past 12 months.

INTRODUCTION

Generally, in a market place there are three key factors namely, demand, supply and price which determine shape and the very existence of the particular market. This is common for labour market too. Labour market is an intangible place where those who are in search of the labour and those who are able and willing to supply the labour, meet together.

Demand for labour is the number of employment opportunities available in the public and private sector institutions in and outside of the country. Supply of the labour represents the number of persons enter into the world of work from schools, universities, and technical and vocational training institutions. Price of the labour reflects the wage rates at which the Sri Lankan labour is exchanged locally and internationally.

This bulletin presents the labour market information such as demand for labour, labour force, employment, unemployment, wages and vocational training school and university performance in the Sri Lankan labour market. It reflects the characteristics, current trends and patterns of the Sri Lankan labour market.

Labour market information contained in this bulletin will be important for policy makers and planners at various levels in the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) sector of the country. Employers, job seekers, trainees and career guidance agencies will find this information valuable for the researchers in the particular sectors.

Labour market information presented in this bulletin is a result of the analysis done on the data collected and tabulated from the sources of Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission, Technical and Vocational Education and Training providers, Department of Census and Statistics, Board of Investment and the Foreign Employment Bureau of Sri Lanka. These organizations deserve appreciation for timely supply of data pertaining to demand for and supply of Labour.

SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS

Demand for Labour

- 133,170 informal sector (advertisements published in the classified columns) and 27,763 formal sector (advertisements published by enterprises with their own titles in the paper) advertisements were counted during the period of January to December 2019.
- More than 80 percent of total job advertisements were published for Service Workers & Shop & Market Sales Workers, Craft and Related Workers, Elementary Occupations, Technicians and Associate Professionals, and Plant & Machine Operators and Assemblers categories in 2019.
- 37 percent of the advertisements were not preferred gender during year 2019.
- · About 15.6 percent of the advertisements required previous work experience during the year 2019.

Employment

- · About 8.18 million employments was reported during the period of January to December 2019.
- 31,005 employment opportunities have been estimated through BOI approved investments during the period of January to December 2019.
- 203,186 employees have gone for foreign employment through registered sources during the period of January to December 2019.
- 21.2 percent of departures to Kuwait for foreign employment was reported during the year 2019.

Unemployment

- From the total unemployed persons, 71.8 percent were recorded as undergone no vocational training during the period of January to December 2019.
- It was reported 4.8 percent unemployment rate for the period of January to December in 2019 while female unemployment rate was reported as 7.4 percent.

Vocational Training

- 67,339 persons have received 78,007 of National Vocational Qualification Certificates in 147 occupational categories during January to December 2019.
- It has been seen that 6.7 percent of National Vocational Qualification certificates were obtained through Recognition of Prior Learning system in 2019.

his section describes demand for jobs in government, private and NGO sector over several consecutive years up to the period under review. The job demand is classified into formal, informal. gender, experience requirements, educational attainment. main occupational category and industrial sector according to the newspaper advertisement survey conducted by Market Information the Labour section of Tertiary and Vocational **Education Commission.**

SECTION - 1 | DEMAND FOR LABOUR

Section 1 discusses the demand for labour in Sri Lanka. Demand for labour was obtained from the Newspaper job advertisements survey done by the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission. The Newspaper job advertisements survey has considered two weekend newspapers, 'Sunday Observer' and 'Lankadeepa' that are the key newspapers publishing the job advertisements in Sri Lanka. In addition, since 2008, job advertisements published in the Government Gazette are also included in the survey. Job advertisements were counted carefully avoiding repeating advertisements published in the two newspapers and the Government Gazette.

In the year 2019, there were 160,933 job advertisements published in both newspapers and the Government Gazette. Previous year shows an increase (215,991) when compared with the year 2019 (160,933). Considering job provider, private sector has dominated as the leading job provider with 99 percent of the total job advertisements appeared in 2019.

Graph 1.1: Percentage Distribution



Table 1.2 reveals that, the number of job advertisements published under the informal classification is higher than the formal classification. 82.7 percent of the total job advertisements were published under the informal classification in 2019.

Graph 1.2: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements by Formal/Informal Classification in 2019



Considering the gender preference of the advertisements, 37 percent of total job advertisements have not specified the gender preference in 2019. As shown in table 1.3, percentage of male preference advertisements is higher than that of females. 44.9 percent of advertisements preferred male while 18.1 percent preferred to recruit female workers in 2019.


There were 25,142 (15.6%) advertisements that required previous work experience in 2019. 84.4 percent of the total job advertisements have not specified the previous work experience.



As per table 1.5, 1,941 (1.21%) job advertisements have required Degree & above educational qualification and 3,449 (2.14%) job advertisements have required GCE A/L qualification in 2019. 94.7 percent of the total job advertisements have not specified the requirement of educational qualifications.

Graph 1.5: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements by Educational Attainment in 2019



Graph 1.6: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements by Main Occupational Category in 2019





Graph 1.7: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements by Advertisement Classification and Gender in 2019



Graph 1.9: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements Requiring Experience by Gender in 2019



Graph 1.10: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements Requiring Experience by Educational Attainment in 2019







Graph 1.13: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements by Occupational Category for the Construction Sector in 2019


















2.2.1: Trends in Foreign Employment Opportunities

During the year 2018, a large number of workers that was 211,459 had gone for foreign employment through registered sources. The highest number of departures for foreign employment was recorded for Qatar (24%). Percentage of the departures for foreign employment for Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and U.A.E. were recorded 22.2, 17.0 and 15.5 respectively of the total departures for foreign employment. According to the graph 2.2.1.2, in all manpower levels, percentage of male departures was higher than that of female departures except in the housemaid category in 2018. Housemaid category recorded the highest number of departures for foreign employment.

Graph 2.2.1.2: Percentage of Departures for Foreign Employment in 2019 by Manpower Level and Gender





Graph 2.2.1.3: Foreign Employment Placements by Year






2.2.2: Trends in foreign employment placements for different level of jobs

Graph 2.2.2.1: Trend in Professional Jobs


Graph 2.2.2.2: Trend in Middle level jobs







Graph 2.2.2.3: Trend in skilled jobs

Graph 2.2.2.5: Trend in Housemaid jobs






Graph 2.2.3.1: Trends in Selected Techniciance and Associate Professionals











Graph 3.1.1.3: Composition of Currently Unemployed Persons by expected Employment Type and Gender in 2019





Graph 3.1.1.5: Percentage Distribution of Unemployed Persons according to level of **Education by Age Group in 2019**



Graph 3.2.1.1A: Female Unemployment by Vocational Training in 2019








Graph 4.1.2.1: Recruitments and Completions in Selected Public Sector Training Organizations in 2019




Graph 4.2.1.1: Top 10 Recruitment in Department of Technical Education & Training in 2019




Graph 4.2.1.2: Training Performance in DTET by District in 2019





Graph 4.2.3.1A: Training Performance in NAITA by Training Type in 2019



Graph 4.2.3.2: Recruitment and Completion in District Center Based Training in NAITA by District in 2019





Graph 4.2.3.4: Recruitment and Completion in Enterprise Based NVQ Training in NAITA by District in 2019




Graph 4.2.4.1: Recruitment and Completion in Vocational Training Authority by Province and District in 2019



Graph 4.3.1: Number of NVQ Certificates issued from 2010 to 2019



Graph 4.3.2: Number of NVQ Certificate Recipients According to Training Provider by Gender in 2019





SECTION - 5 | LABOUR MARKET SIGNALS FOR STAKEHOLDERS

5.1: SRI LANKAN CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY: THE PRESENT AND FUTURE TO BE [CONTRACTOR POINT OF VIEW]

In any country, the performance of the construction industry is often considered as a barometric development. At present, the Sri Lankan construction industry is plagued by many factors such as low construction volume especially due to Covid 19 pandemic, skilled workers shortage, high construction costs, and unequal competition from foreign contractors. The numbers tell the simply story as construction industry grew by 6.8 % and 4% respectively, at current and constant price in 2019. Further, in recent years, construction industry has contributed about 9% to the GDP, employing more than 600,000 direct jobs. The total annual construction turnover is about Rs. 800 Billion as per the statistics. From these figures it can be mentioned that construction industry is the one of major contributor for the local GDP along with the generation of employment.

Despite the challenges faced due to various reasons, the construction industry in Sri Lanka will remain in growth phase in present and it will further boom in near future. Enhancement of construction industry is a symptom of developing country. It is a healthy headache for the industry despite micro challenges faced and excreted pressure on it. However, a burning question will be that, are we ready to meet the challenges which are created by such booming construction industry itself. As described in previous section, there may be major factors affecting the construction industry and some of them will be temporal and some will be repetitions. In additions, some issues are beyond our control and that will be created by the opportunities and system characteristics.

However, the growing demand will be prevailed in near future in Sri Lankan construction industry and to grasp the opportunities the construction sector should be ready and equipped with required weapons. During last few years it was a crystal clear fact that unavailability of skilled workers was a critical factor for the smooth operation of the industry. As a result, all leading contractors faced significant issues and due to this unbalances/vacuum many projects were delayed to complete. According the experienced it is gained during last few years, all other factors can be controlled to greater extent, but no the skill workmanship. It is well known fact the top tiers of the construction industry are secured, the middle and lower tiers are in inadequate/skew shape in Sri Lanka. The inflows to the construction industry are significantly poor despite different authorities/agencies/organization/NGO/ private sector and even government has taken commendable efforts.

Based on our field experience, the following segments are drawn significant attention to meet the construction challenges in Sri Lanka but not limited to

- Tillers
- Interior and exterior painters
- Electricians
- MEP technicians [Plumbers/AC technicians etc]
- Laboratory technicians
- Skilled masons
- Multi skilled craftsmen
- Aluminum Fabricators and fitters
- Crane Operators/ JCB/Excavator operators

All the responsible parties to take combined and collectively effort to absorb/educate/train and guiding to find respective jobs for such categories. For this process the effective and positive contribution of the private sector is a must. Through, even the past and present, there is different mechanism for above mentioned processes, it is a proven fact, and the mechanism has lot to improve. It is mainly because, the private construction companies uses new technology/ improved productivity/better time, cost, quality management/higher efficiency and updates software to manage the projects. Gathering around the private sector is paramount important task in the present so that future of construction industry can be guaranteed to a greater extent.

Merging the current technology and new technology is another key aspect to attend by all responsible parties. This is a segment where foreign contractors and technicians are highlighted. Equipped with advance technology and materials are key to progress and success. In order to achieve this research and development (R & D) and systematic approaches are to be considered deeply. The Local research organization and Universities can play a significant role here and coordinating this mechanism is heavily laid in responsible agencies including government. Exploring alternative materials for conventional and depleting materials are utmost important in present and future construction industry if it is needed to remain as a competitor.

Favorable and encouraging policies for construction industry is another aspect to create by the government and in that process more comfort to be assigned to local contractors. It is mainly because only local contractors can facilitate to young blood to train and equip with the necessary skills for the new comers.

Overall, the Sri Lankan construction industry in a growth phase in present and in future it will blossom. The created opportunities should be grasping well and our industry should be ready for that. Considering and foreseeing the industry future, some of the leading construction companies, as a leading and most diversified construction company in Sri Lanka have made significant approaches towards this already. Having cordial and professional relationship with all above mentioned partners and allocation investment budget and allowing ample training facilities for all new comers and introducing new technologies to the industry and researching industry development are key segments they have initiated. These companies are in the determination of providing all facilities and systematic approaches towards the preparing "human assert" to construction industry in Sri Lanka as they believe it is the most important wheel to roll.

5.2: CURRENT AND FUTURE BEHAVIOR IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING IN AUTOMOBILE SECTOR IN SRI LANKA.

TVEC has been engaged in development of Vocational Education and Training (VET) plans for key industry sectors of the economy of Sri Lanka since 1999. Further, TVEC started development VET Plans for Provinces since 2009. Automobile industry plays a very important role in the economy of any country and lives of people. It facilitates mobility of the people both rich and poor alike in almost all countries. Automobile development has focused to address the needs of all segments of the society.

Automobile Repair, Maintenance and Services Industry thus has also become very important economic activity in the country and all enterprises in the automobile repair and maintenance industry are striving to provide quality service to the customers. The quality, productivity and expansion/ growth of their services will depend on the availability of trained, skilled and adaptive workforce in this industry.

Therefore, training of automobile technicians, supervisors, drivers and other para-service personnel is also a priority area and that is why all training providers including DTET being the earliest training provider had commenced training of automobile technician since inception of their training centres. However, training of automobile technicians and other service personnel has become very challengeable as trainers and training facilities need to be kept improving in par with advancing technologies in automobile industry.

Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission has as explained earlier, the mandate to establish a demand driven training system in the country which supplies skilled manpower to meet the employment needs of the industry. TVEC thus undertakes to prepare Vocational Education Training Plans, which are planning documents which detail strategies, priority areas and specific initiatives for training of workforce needed for most industry sectors in the country. Such VET plans are expected to be implemented by TVET providers in the country.

Major Challenges Faced by the Individual Enterprises in Automobile Sector in Sri Lanka

Skills shortage is a major issue faced by the individual enterprises in automobile sector. These enterprises experienced severe shortage of skilled personnel in body repair and paint occupations. They pointed out that retaining of experienced technicians has become very difficult due to availability of opportunities for foreign employment with higher salaries. Even smaller companies faced difficulties to retain youth trained by them as these trained youth aspire to join reputed companies.
