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CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

- 01. Informal Advertisements : Advertisements published in the classified columns of the newspapers
- 02. Formal Advertisements : Advertisements published by enterprises with their own titles in the newspaper.

Following concepts and definitions used in the Quarterly Labour Force Survey, conducted by the Department of Census & Statistics, have been used in this publication.

- **03.** Labour Force : The labour force is composed of the economically active population of 15 years of age and over.
- **04.** The Economically Active population : Is defined as those persons who are/ were employed or unemployed during the reference period of the survey.
- **05.** Not in labour force (not economically active) : Persons who were neither working nor available/looking for work are classified as "not in the labour force". Persons are not in the labour force for such reasons as: full time care of the household, full-time students, retired or old age, infirmed or disabled, or are not interested in working for one reason or another.
- **06.** Employed : Persons, who worked as paid employees, employers own account workers (self employed), or unpaid family workers during the reference period are said to be employed. This includes persons with a job but not at work during the reference period.
- **07. Unemployed** : Persons available and/or looking for work, and who did not work and tried to find a job during the reference period.
- 08. Employee : The person, who works for payment.
- 09. Employer : The person, who employs at least one paid employee under him
- 10. Own account worker : The person, who works for own or only with contributory family workers.
- 11. Unpaid family worker : The person who works on his own family enterprise without any payment.
- 12. Unemployment rate : Represent the number of unemployed persons as a percentage of the economically active labour force.
- **13.** Reference Period : In this survey there are two (2) reference periods, "current" reference period is the week preceding the week of the survey, i.e., last week. The "usual" reference period preceding 12 months, i.e., the past 12 months.

INTRODUCTION

Generally, in a market place there are three key factors namely, demand, supply and price which determine shape and the very existence of the particular market. This is common for labour market too. Labour market is an intangible place where those who are in search of the labour and those who are able and willing to supply the labour, meet together.

Demand for labour is the number of employment opportunities available in the public and private sector institutions in and outside of the country. Supply of the labour represents the number of persons enter into the world of work from schools, universities, and technical and vocational training institutions. Price of the labour reflects the wage rates at which the Sri Lankan labour is exchanged locally and internationally.

This bulletin presents the labour market information such as demand for labour, labour force, employment, unemployment, wages and vocational training school and university performance in the Sri Lankan labour market. It reflects the characteristics, current trends and patterns of the Sri Lankan labour market.

Labour market information contained in this bulletin will be important for policy makers and planners at various levels in the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) sector of the country. Employers, job seekers, trainees and career guidance agencies will find this information valuable for the researchers in the particular sectors.

Labour market information presented in this bulletin is a result of the analysis done on the data collected and tabulated from the sources of Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission, Technical and Vocational Education and Training providers, Department of Census and Statistics, Board of Investment and the Foreign Employment Bureau of Sri Lanka. These organizations deserve appreciation for timely supply of data pertaining to demand for and supply of Labour.

Demand for Labour

- 45,623 informal sector (advertisements published in the classified columns) and 9,136 formal sector (advertisements published by enterprises with their own titles in the paper) advertisements were counted during the period of January to June 2020.
- More than 80 percent of total job advertisements were published for Service Workers & Shop & Market Sales Workers, Craft and Related Workers, Elementary Occupations, Technicians and Associate Professionals, and Plant & Machine Operators and Assemblers categories in 1st half of 2020.
- 63.6 percent of the advertisements were not preferred gender during the 1st half of 2020.
- · About 9.2 percent of the advertisements required previous work experience during the 1st half of 2020.

Employment

- About 7.99 million employments was reported during the period of January to June 2020.
- 4,343 employment opportunities have been estimated through BOI approved investments during the period of January to June 2020.
- 40,581 employees have gone for foreign employment through all sources during the period of January to June 2020.
- 19.2 percent of departures to Qatar for foreign employment was reported during the 1st half of 2020.

Unemployment

- From the total unemployed persons, 74.2 percent were recorded as undergone no vocational training during the period of January to June 2020.
- It was reported 3.9 percent unemployment rate for the period of January to June in 2020 while female unemployment rate was reported as 8.9 percent.

Vocational Training

- 12,886 persons have received 14,607 of National Vocational Qualification Certificates in 147 occupational categories during January to June 2020.
- It has been seen that 10.5 percent of National Vocational Qualification certificates were obtained through Recognition of Prior Learning system in 1stb half of 2020.

Section 1:

his section describes the demand for jobs in government, private and NGO sector over several consecutive years up to the period under review. The job demand is classified into formal, informal. gender, experience requirements, educational attainment, main occupational category and industrial sector according to the newspaper advertisement survey conducted by Market Information the Labour section of Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission.

SECTION - 1 | DEMAND FOR LABOUR

Section 1 discusses the demand for labour in Sri Lanka. Demand for labour was obtained from the Newspaper job advertisements survey done by the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission. The Newspaper job advertisements survey has considered two weekend newspapers, 'Sunday Observer' and 'Lankadeepa' that are the key newspapers publishing the job advertisements in Sri Lanka. In addition, since 2008, job advertisements published in the Government Gazette are also included in the survey. Job advertisements were counted carefully avoiding repeating advertisements published in the two newspapers and the Government Gazette.

A considerable decline was observed of the total number of job advertisements published during the first half of 2020 compared to the corresponding period of the previous year (86,206) due to the COVID 19 pandemic.

In the 1st half of 2020, there were 54,759 job advertisements published in both newspapers and the Government Gazette. Considering the job provider, private sector has dominated as the leading job provider with 99 percent of the total job advertisements appeared in the 1st half of 2020.



Table 1.2 reveals that, the number of job advertisements published under the informal classification is higher than the formal classification. 83.3 percent of the total job advertisements were published under the informal classification in the 1st half of 2020.

Graph 1.2: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements by Formal/ Informal Classification in 1st half of 2020







Graph 1.4: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements by Experience Requirement in 1st half of 2020















Graph 1.9: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements Requiring Experience by Gender in 1st half of 2020



Graph 1.10: Percentage Distribution of Job Advertisements Requiring Experience by Educational Attainment in 1st half of 2020













Graph 2.1.1.2: Percentage Share of Employment by Industrial Group in 1st half of 2020**





"Graph 2.1.1.3: Percentage Share of Currently Employed Persons by Occupational Group (Based on ISCO 08) in 1st half of 2020"












2.2.1: Trends in Foreign Employment Opportunities










Graph 2.2.2.1: Trend in Professional Jobs

Graph 2.2.2.3: Trend in skilled jobs


Graph 2.2.2.2: Trend in Middle level jobs

Graph 2.2.3.1: Trends in Selected Techniciance and Associate Professionals






Graph 2.2.3.2: Trends in Selected Plant and Machine Operators and Assemblers











Graph 3.1.1.2: Percentage Distribution of **Unemployed Population by Gender in 1st** half of 2020





Graph 3.1.1.3: Percentage Distribution of Currently Unemployed Persons by Expected Employment type & Gender - 1st half 2020





Graph 3.1.1.5: Percentage Distribution of Unemployed Persons according to level of Education by Age Group - 1st half 2020



According to table 3.2.1.1, about 26 percent of the total unemployed persons have followed vocational training. In other words, it indicates that about 74 percent of unemployed persons were without any vocational training in the first half of 2020.

Graph 3.2.1.1: Male Unemployment by Vocational Training - 1st half 2020






Graph 3.2.1.2: Educational Status of Unemployed Males Without any Training -1st half 2020




Graph 4.1.2.1: Recruitments and Completions in Selected Public Sector Training Organizations in the 1st half of 2020



Graph 4.2.1.1: Top 10 Recruitments in Department of Technical Education & Training in the 1st half of 2020







Graph 4.2.3.1B: Recruitments and completions in On the Job Training and In-plant Training by Gender in NAITA in the 1st half of 2020



Graph 4.2.3.2: Recruitment and Completion in District Center Based Training in NAITA by District in the 1st half of 2020 $\,$



Graph 4.2.4.1: Recruitments and Completions in Vocational Training Authority by Province and District in the 1st half of 2020



As shown in the table 4.2.4.2, the highest number of recruitments was recorded for National Certificate - ICT Technician course in the 1st half of 2020. More than thousand trainees were recruited each for National Certificate - ICT Technician, National Certificate - Dress Maker and National Certificate - Hair Dresser courses in the 1st half of 2020.

SECTION - 4.3 | National Vocational Qualification (NVQ)

The highest number of NVQ certificates of the public sector training institutes was issued for courses conducted by Vocational Training Authority in the 1st half of 2020. It was 3,882. As per table 4.3.2, Private sector recorded 29 percent of the total number of NVQ certificate recipients in the 1st half of 2020. Furthermore, female recipients were higher than male recipients only for National Youth Services Council of the public sector training institutes. As shown in the table 4.3.3, 10.6 percent of the total number of NVQ certificates were issued qualification through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) method.

Graph 4.3.1: Number of NVQ Certificates issued from 2010 to 2019



Graph 4.3.2: Number of NVQ Certificate Recipients According to Training Provider by Gender in the 1st half of 2020





SECTION - 5 | LABOUR MARKET SIGNALS FOR STAKEHOLDERS

Vocational Education and Training Plan For Electrical and Electronics Industry Sector

The Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission (TVEC) being the apex level policy making body for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) sector of Sri Lanka is entrusted with the task of planning, coordination and development of TVET at all levels in keeping with the human resource needs of the economy. In order to achieve this task, TVEC expects to map and identify human resources and skills requirements of growing industry sectors and prepare Vocational Education and Training (VET) plans. Based on the VET plan, TVET providers are expected to organize their training delivery.

The Electrical and Electronics industry in Sri Lanka grew significantly over the past 45 years and saw it being gradually elevated to the position a key manufacturing industry contributing towards export-oriented economic growth. Electronic technology is an important indicator of modernization. In this sense, without the electronics industry, there would be no modernizations. The Sri Lankan Electrical and Electronics industry mainly caters for Automobiles, Telecommunication, Consumer Electronics, Power Generation, Transmission and Distribution, Industrial Automation and Medical Sector. At present the country has become a center of excellence for electronics design and development and moving towards the emerging technologies such as IoT, Robotics, Bio- medical, Analytics and to world known Research and Developments.

TVEC has developed a VET Plan for Electrical and Electronics Sector in 2012. It has been updated to address the skilled and semi-skilled employment gaps in the Electrical and Electronics manufacturing and export industry and to overcome it as stipulated in the National Export Strategy (NES). Electrical and Electronics Industry is striving to provide quality products and services to the customers in both local and foreign markets. The quality, productivity and expansion/ growth of electricity supply, electrical and electronics manufacturing and services in the Electrical and Electronics industry will all depend on the availability of trained, skilled and adaptive workforce in this industry. Therefore, training of craftsmen, technicians, supervisors, and other personnel in occupations and occupational areas in Electrical and Electronics industry has been a priority area and it is needed an updated VET Plan all the time.

The industry contributed USD 381.17 Million to the Sri Lanka exports in 2019 and absorbs over 35,000 skilled workers in its multi-faceted activities. The workforce is drawn from a pool of skilled young men and women with basic academic and technical knowledge.

For long term sustainability of the Electrical and Electronics industry sector, the most important factors to address are the stability of economic growth, political environment, government policies and fiscal and tax incentives for investors and local businesses. In addition, support in getting the capital and market access is also essential. The most important factor for the growth and sustainability of this industry sector is the availability of skilled and competent workforce.

Based on the analyses of Industry survey findings, following recommendations could be made for the Training plan.

- It is necessary to promote NVQ among industries especially outside the Western Province.
- Strengthen linkage between TVET Institutions and Industry.
- It is required to supply the training according to the industry demand
- Production Line Operator and Electrical Draft Person would be new occupations to be considered in the Training Plan.

According to the interview survey done with industry leaders and experts, following needs were identified

- It was highlighted gaps in technical skills and soft skills of trainees
- It is required to provide specialized training for the training staff
- Skill Upgrading

Industry has pointed out that it is not possible to cover everything in courses and TVET institutions should facilitate skills upgrading. Trainers explained that non-availability curricula for specialized skills is a problem. They suggested to include stand-alone competency units in National Competency Standards (NCS) and curricula and facilitate assessment for Record of Achievement for those unit.

Foreign Employment Trends Identified from Key Informant Interviews

There exists a good demand for Electricians in Australia which is currently dominated by Indian workers. Therefore, wiring regulations of other countries need to be included in training and assistance to be given to get licenses to work in such foreign labour markets. It will boost sales of local electrical products in other countries as well.

Supply of Skills from TVET Institutions to the Electrical and Electronics industry Sector

Recommendations

- Establish electronics courses in outstation districts to have uniform course mix in districts. Suggestion is to introduce a minimum number of courses to districts having no courses at all to improve accessibility to TVET by the aspiring youth living in the districts.
- · Increase NVQ assessment in CBT and EBT courses
- Strengthen training management to increase enrolment to the full capacity in all relevant courses and increase the completion rate.
- Promote RPL for certifying the workforce already employed in the Electrical and Electronics industry sector thus providing them necessary upskilling, initiating career paths and improving their retention in continuing employment.

Tracer Study on NVQ Certificate Holders in Electrical and Electronics Industry Related Occupations

Recommendations

- Include training in new / smart technologies related to automation and digitization, PLC programming, CCTV technology and IoT as stand-alone modules.
- All trainees should be given some opportunity to follow at least a short-term training in large & reputed companies.

The Electrical and Electronics Component Manufacturing Sector for Export Market

Recommendations

 A Proposal will be included in the Training Plan to establish training centres in zones with facilities to train production line operators for Electronics careers. When a training centre is established, it should have facilities to train other demanded occupations too. Most of Zone employees have 8-hour shift and they have free time to follow a training course as well.

- National Youth Service Council (NYSC) Sapugaskanda Training Centre is very close to Biyagama Industrial Zone. This training centre could immediately commence part time training courses to train employees in the Biyagama Industrial Zone. Funding Modalities need to be discussed and arranged.
- There are a large number of technical crafts persons in Electrical Component Manufacturing companies without appropriate national Qualification. The proposed training centres could organize NVQ Assessments through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) for them and if necessary, offer them short training to bridge the skills gaps. This will pave the way for them to transfer from informal learning to formal learning and thus pursue studies for higher qualifications.

These programmes will improve image of occupations and that will increase the attraction of workers for employment in Industrial zones and extend their retention in the jobs.

Implementation of this VET Plan will address most skills issues in the Electrical and Electronics industry. It will enable the Electrical and Electronics sector to move forward as an industry of excellence with the contribution from competent and productive workforce.
